Faith Formation:

Forming ourselves in our Catholic faith is a foundational element in helping each of us understand and live in the example of Christ.

Adult and Youth Faith Ambassadors (YFAs)

Improve student application of scripture, sacramental life, and Catholic social teachings by:

- Ensuring that Sacred Spaces and visual signs of our faith are evident throughout the school
- Providing students with leadership opportunities to share morning prayers, gospel readings and reflections
- Enhanced relationship with God and promote faith and inclusivity for all
- Regular meetings to develop and implement an ongoing plan to build a strong faith community and promote global citizenship, through social justice outreach initiatives and environmental stewardship
- Opportunities to student and staff participation in faith development, through daily prayers, liturgies, virtues assemblies, school masses, ambassador gatherings and student/staff retreats at the school, family, and board level.

Prayer and Scripture

Prayer is an essential component in experiencing God's presence and in developing a relationship with God, Mary and following in Jesus' footsteps. Various forms of prayer are used both in class and school wide through:

- Daily prayer on PA system, in class and Staff Weekly bulletin
- In class prayers, including Grace Before Meals, end of day prayer and liturgies gathered around sacred spaces
- Building religious literacy through, gestures as prayer such as; the sign of the Cross, appropriate responses and gestures during scripture and Gospel reading
- Encouraging students and staff to pray throughout the day.

Parish, Home and School Connection

Queen of Heaven is fortunate to belong to the Parish of St. Dominic's and have Father Terry Dias as our spiritual leader. He adds to the development and celebration of our faith. Ongoing and effective communication between the home, school and parish is essential for supporting our students' faith formation and creating successful learning experiences. Fr. Terry will be making visits to our school and interacting with the children for specific purposes and to celebrate masses. Every year school administration meets with parish clergy to plan, review, and discuss liturgical events and sacramental preparation.

Catechesis

The subject of Religion is taught for approximately 150 minutes per week. Religion is also taught and integrated into all subject areas. All teachers teach the Canadian catechism which is the official program of the Canadian church and which includes:

- The Family Life, Fully Alive program
- Grades two and seven sacramental preparations
- Grade four child sexual abuse prevention

Divisional and classroom opportunities for virtual liturgies and other faith related activities.

Sacramental Preparation:

As Catholics, we understand sacraments to be "outward signs instituted by Christ to give grace." Together in partnership with our parish, we support the preparation of God's children in receiving the sacraments.

Social Justice / Outreach Activities / Charities:

Catholic Social Teachings of the Church root our actions in supporting human dignity and the preferential option of the poor which calls us to serve the most vulnerable in the world.

As a community of faith, we show our compassion and respond in practical ways to the needs of the larger community. This includes:

- Gospel messages incorporated into daily prayers over PA system, in class and through curricula.
- Our school participates in ShareLife through Spirit Weeks and ongoing activities throughout the year.
- Being welcoming and inclusive to all.
- Following Jesus' example in daily activities.

- Social Justice Activities: Our school will focus on the Seven Themes of Catholic Social Teaching as we support a variety of outreach activities: ShareLife, Autism Awareness, Terry Fox, Christmas Gift Cards, Food Drives.
- Land Acknowledgment as a part of our morning announcements.

Students are encouraged to demonstrate a committed call to service that aligns with the Catholic social teaching recognizing the human dignity of all members of our school community and world.

Recognizing Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations:

Framed by the Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations (OCSGE), our graduates will be effective communicators, reflective thinkers, lifelong learners, collaborative contributors, caring family members, responsible citizens and discerning believers formed in the Catholic faith community.

To celebrate the OCSGEs, we as a school community challenge our students to be active members by participating in various activities. Each month students from different classes lead a virtue assembly. We encourage our intermediate students to minister to the family, school, parish and wider community through service as part of their preparation and support of the sacrament of Confirmation. Students at Queen of Heaven, participate in ongoing activities that promote the OCSGE, to ensure that they become:

- Discerning believers formed in the Catholic tradition – We celebrate the signs and sacred mystery of God’s presence through word, sacrament, prayer, forgiveness, reflection and moral living. Some examples of ways to demonstrate this includes knowing the story of our faith, participating in the sacramental life, reflecting on God’s word, seeking to be in communion with God and others, respecting our faith traditions, integrating faith in our lives, and recognizing that we all have weaknesses, and we have forgiveness to help us through them.
- Effective communicators – We speak, write, and listen honestly and sensitively, responding critically considering gospel values. Examples of how we accomplish this include listening, understanding, using, and reading oral and written materials effectively, presenting information and ideas clearly, and writing and speaking fluently in Canada’s official languages.
- Reflective and creative thinkers – We solve problems and make responsible decisions with an informed moral conscience for the common good. Examples of

this includes creating, adapting, and evaluating news ideas, thinking reflectively and creatively to evaluate situations and solve problems and making good decisions.

- Self-directed, responsible, lifelong learners – We develop and demonstrate our full God-given potential. We can accomplish this through demonstrating flexibility and adaptability, setting appropriate and goals and priorities for our work and personal life, and participating in a balanced and healthy lifestyle.
- Collaborative contributors – We find meaning, dignity and vocation in work which respects the rights of all and contribute to the common good. Examples include working effectively as a team member, and respecting the rights, responsibilities and contributions of ourselves and others.
- Caring family members – We attend to our family, school, parish, and the wider community. This involves relating to family members in a loving, compassionate and respectful manner in our school and home families.
- Responsible citizen – We give witness to Catholic social teaching by promoting peace, justice, and the sacredness of human life. Examples of achieving this includes accepting accountability for one's own actions, seeking and granting forgiveness, respecting and affirming diversity, respecting the environment and using its resources wisely and contributing to the common good.

The Ontario Catholic School Graduate Expectations have contributed in various ways to being a shining light for Catholic schools since 1998. These expectations guide the journey of learning for all students in Catholic schools, therefore, are described not only in terms of knowledge and skills, but also in terms of values, attitudes and actions informed by reason and faith.

Celebrating Virtues:

A virtue is a habit or established capacity to perform good actions according to a moral standard. When we practice these virtues, we strengthen them and thereby make the presence of God more and more visible in the world around us.

The notion of virtue is deeply rooted in Catholic Christian tradition. It is in a community of caring, committed partners that we find the space and time to become our best selves.

By practicing the virtues, we develop habits of goodness that help us to resist the temptation of sin. Practicing virtue also gets us ready to contribute to the good of all people. In our school community, virtue formation contributes to a healthy positive learning environment by fostering a climate in which all members feel safe, confident, and hope-filled about themselves, their relationships, and their futures.

By praying, we receive the grace of God to continue to concentrate on finding ways to follow Jesus' example in all that we say and do.

Visible Signs of our Faith:
